Nestled in the quiet, there lies a resting potential waiting through the long winter for a new kind of spring. I picture this



Misconceptions about the Twilights, Part I By Robert Hunt, Curator

Over the last one hundred and fifty years, much has been written about Alexander Twilight, his wife Mercy Ladd Merrill Twilight, and their years associated with the Orleans Country Grammar School. Researching the lives of those long dead is an interesting but often difficult task. Primary sources are the most reliable information, but even these can be misleading. The first legal mention of Alexander Twilight is in Vol. 1, page 71 of the Corinth, Vermont Town Records. A postdated group listing of the children of Ichabod and Mary Twilight lists their third child as "Alexandria", and was copied on an index card in Vermont Vital Records as "FEMALE BIRTH", Alexandria Twilight, September 23, 1795." This is just one example of what can happen when trying to decipher old hand

written records.

Whenever there is a tour of the Old Stone House, it usually begins with a brief history of Brownington and the start of the Orleans County Grammar School in 1823. This is quickly followed by the employment of Alexander Twilight as headmaster and minister in 1829, as well as the statement, "Alexander Twilight was born in Corinth, Vermont in 1795." But was he? To answer this we need to look at the life of Alexander's father, Ichabod Twilight. See our next newsletter edition for the move to Corinth and Ichabod's background.

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Historic Green Spaces

At the Old Stone House Museum, we are working hard to maintain the pristine nature of our little corner of Northern Vermont. The Old Stone House village sits atop rural rolling farm hills that typify picturesque Vermont.

A natural pond graces the lowest point on the property, alive with cattails, turtles and pollywogs. The hill fields of the Museum's acreage wave with sweet timothy in the summer and glisten with untouched snow in the winter. Fall blazes with the colors of oak, maple, ash and butternut.

We hope to share our precious microcosm with our visitors and commu-

nity through a series of small projects called "Historic Green Spaces". We want to develop walking trails around our 60 acre village; walking, playing, dog walk-



ing, horseback riding, skiing and snowshoeing welcome! A heritage arboretum including a large variety of native apple trees, butternuts, ash and maples is already established with the help of NorthWoods Stewardship Center and a guide brochure is available to the public. We have received grants and donations to build an educational apiary on site with the goal of encouraging pollination and conservation.
