Old Stone House Museum to unveil Twilight exhibit

The Old Stone House Museum is opening its doors for the first time since the onset of the COVID pandemic, and is doing so with the unveiling of its new exhibit celebrating African American Alexander Lucius Twilight on Saturday, June 19, at 11 a.m. Light refreshments will be provided for the exhibit dedication with museum tours until 3 p.m., with no admittance fee.

This ceremony will take place on Juneteenth, the holiday celebrating the emancipation of those who had been enslaved in the United States. The museum celebrates the day in 1865 when enslaved people were set free in Texas by executive decree two years after the Emancipation Proclamation. This day is now seen as the official end to slavery in the United States and also falls eight years after Mr. Twilight died here in Brownington.

The exhibit will return Mr. Twilight's artifacts to the home he built, the Alexander Twilight House, where they will be on prominent display in the parlor. The items include Mr. Twilight's desk, trunk, *Bible*, sermons, iron bar, ox yoke, and books. The coffee set and silver spoons belonging to his wife, Mercy Ladd Merrill Twilight, will also be

available for viewing along with framed photographs of the couple.

"The exhibit will offer a renewed look at this amazing man with some new, fresh interpretation," said Molly Veysey, Old Stone House Museum and Historic Village executive director.

The new exhibit will also include the proclamation U.S. Representative Peter Welch read into the Congressional Record in 2020, recognizing Mr. Twilight's two-hundred and twenty-fifth anniversary. In addition, the concurrent resolution passed last year by the Vermont State Legislature, recognizing Mr. Twilight's birthday, September 23, as Alexander Twilight Day, will also be included. In addition to recognizing this holiday, the museum has adopted a diversity, equity and inclusion statement. The Old Stone House Museum and Historic Village Board of Trustees adopted this statement at its February 11 meeting. Part of the statement reads: "The Old Stone House Museum and Historic Village aspires to be the space for open dialog around the interconnected issues of inequality in our shared society." — from the Old Stone Museum and Historic Village.
